



McFadden did the cover art for "Okinawa Memories" as signed in the lower right corner.








Mat.making is an important Okinawan craft since the entire flor space of homes is covered with mats.They are nade of grass and turned out on a kandboom.

Three of McFadden's drawings appear to be taken from photos that appeared in "Okinawa Memories". Two of them appeared in the 1947 "1st Air Division" book, and one appeared in the April 1946 publication "One Year" This would indicate that "Okinawa Memories" predates the "1st Air Division" book.

Important American, Japanese, and Okinawan figures involved in foreign policy affecting U.S. rule of Okinawa

Col. Charles I. Murray - Marine officer commanding military government operations on Okinawa in 1945 and 1946. He supervised efforts to develop Okinawan self-rule during the year the U.S. Navy administered the island. He was promoted to brigadier general as he retired from the Marine Corps in 1948. He died in 1977.

Addition web information from COMMANDING GENERALS OF THE RYUKYU ISLANDS AND CHANGES IN THE COMMAND STRUCTURE, indicate the following: <u>U.S. Navy relinquishes control, transfers Military</u> <u>Government and Civil Affairs Teams to U.S. Army, 1 July 1946.</u>

This information also indicates that the book "Okinawa Memories" was probably published in 1946
